CITTASLOW ANNUAL AWARDS

On Thursday 14 April 2016, Cittaslow Goolwa joined with the Southern Alexandrina Business Association to recognise people and businesses in our community who do 'that little bit extra' for their customers or care about what happens around our town. Cittaslow Goolwa Patron, Mayor Keith Parkes presented Certificates to 10 individuals and 1 business whose quiet work has put Cittaslow values into action. The following notes were used by President Lyn Clark at the Presentation Dinner:

Each year, Cittaslow Goolwa identifies through nomination, individuals, groups and businesses that have in some way, contributed to the Cittaslow values of our town. These people are not necessarily members of Cittaslow but have been noticed for their unique involvement in and around Goolwa and improving quality of life for all who live in, work in or visit our region.

Simon Ardill

Last month, the Cittaslow Goolwa Food and Wine group arranged a special event where they invited people to "Come and meet and talk to Simon Ardill". The invitation stated that "Simon Ardill has been growing delicious organic fruit from his collection of heritage and rare fruit trees at Currency Creek for over 30 years. Simon is a legend. You can sometimes see him at Goolwa, Marion, Brighton, Willunga and Port Elliot markets selling fruit,

trees, herbs and other plants he has propagated." It went on to say that "He is a fascinating passionate gardener who will share his hints and tips for growing food in our own backyards right here in Goolwa."

When he was nominated for this award, one of the nominators said, "everyone knows Simon's skills in growing things, his commitment to caring for the earth and sharing his skills so that everyone looks after themselves and the planet better, his kindness, humility and generosity - a very humble person." This is just the sort of person that Cittaslow Goolwa is honoured to recognise with this award. He shares. He cares and he doesn't push himself for attention. But Cittaslow would like to recognise his efforts.

When moving to Goolwa ten years ago she renewed an old friendship with Mal Russell and together they've now raised \$144,000 for Variety. These two brilliant ladies have been an inspiration. I've been told that their bingo sessions were not only great fundraisers – but great fun raisers too! But these two have also brought a lot of pleasure and all sorts of mischief to the airwaves through their Aunty Mary and Uncle Harry routines on Alex-FM. Goolwa Pipi Co.

For years, the Goolwa cockle was a favourite bait for fishermen but

now this humble bivalve known as the Goolwa Pipi is gracing silver service restaurants in Sydney and Melbourne and is a favourite with many leading chefs. With the assistance of the South Australia Research Development Institute, Primary Industries and Regions SA, the Fishery Research and Development Association and an innovation voucher from the SA Government, the Goolwa Pipi Company which is a

group of independent pipi harvesters has found a way to package the shellfish so that its shelf life is extended and can now be exported to Asia. Not only have leading chefs like Matt Moran embraced your product, but our own Olaf Hansen from Bombora at Goolwa Beach restaurant has brought a great focus onto Goolwa via his unique Pipi bicycle. Thank you to Olaf. We particularly recognise the outstanding effort by all our fishing families like the Hoads and the extended fishing community as they put into practice their important sustainable harvesting methods and responsible and innovative production methods.



Debbie Smith

Debbie Smith is a relative newcomer to Goolwa. Fortunately Goolwa is not a town where you have to be here for 30 years before you're regarded as a local. Debbie and her husband Ken, like so many of us, have come from somewhere else and brought their experience and talents with them. In a very short time, Debbie

has become another regular Alex-FM voice. She has been active in the Neighbourhood Watch area and has embraced the activities associated with Cittaslow Goolwa. In particular, she has taken on a leading role with the Cittaslow Food and Wine Group which has been hosting 'How To" sessions. These have included sessions about bees and honey, olives, cheese-making. But something that Debbie is getting quite a reputation for is cooking carp. Only the weekend before last, at the Classic Fishing competition in Clayton Bay, she prepared carp sausages, carp patties, carp dip and carp jerky – which were all very popular. Her carp products have also been a huge success as part of platters served

Plans continue to progress as we prepare for the 2017 General Assembly here in Goolwa 9-12 May. Cittaslow Goolwa Patron, Keith Parkes will lead a team of 6 locals who will be attending the Cittaslow International Assembly in Vizela in northern Portugal in June. The team will be encouraging Delegates to plan early to travel "all the way to Australia".

Thanks to funding from the Alexandrina Council, a new video "A Day in Goolwa" has been prepared by Olley Delvecchio. It will be shown in Vizela to encourage delegate to "Come to Goolwa". Thanks to all those individuals, cafés and restaurants who made themselves available for the video. It will be on our website following its launch at the Vizela Assembly.

We are very grateful to Andrew Panozzo, from Investigator College who has translated our first Assembly Planning Information document into Italian. This document will be distributed to the Assembly Delegates in Portugal. Both Investigator College and the Goolwa Primary School have agreed to participate in some of the activities being planned for the Goolwa Assembly.

Thank you sincerely to the Goolwa Lions Club who have agreed to make a generous contribution towards

the provision of translation/interpreting services for the Assembly. FOOD & WINE REPORT

The April meeting was held on Monday 25th of April at Margaret Gardner's home. A summary of matters discussed at the meeting follows.

How To Sessions:

Debbie Smith reported on the session with Simon Ardill which was held on 26th of March. Another successful event this time commencing at Simon's Goolwa garden and, after morning tea, moving to his amazing orchard at Currency Creek. All present enjoyed Simon's generosity in sharing his experiences and expertise in all aspects of gardening including budding and grafting. The carp demonstration at Clayton Bay created a lot of interest from those involved in the fishing competition. All present appreciated the involvement of Cittaslow Goolwa, represented by Debbie and Carol Clarke. The group was reminded that the Clayton Bay Solstice event will be held on Saturday June 18th. Next event involves foraging for Pine Mushrooms in Kuitpo Forest – this will be held on Thursday 19th of May.

Dining Group:

Those present were reminded that the Autumn dinner is to be held at Blues Restaurant, Middleton, on Thursday 26th of May. (see more details elsewhere in this newsletter)

International Assembly:

The group further considered arrangements for the Thursday and Friday dinners. Issues raised included the possible use of Kingsbrook or the Currency Creek winery. The prevailing view was that there should be a quite specific focus on Goolwa food providers and that the Thursday night should be a 'free' night with various Goolwa food providers being offered as options for Assembly attendees. It was agreed that this sentiment be pursued at the next Assembly planning meeting.

FOOD & WINE REPORT (continued)

At The Wharf:

Karen Ross advised that the final summer At The Wharf for 2016, held on Easter Saturday 26th March, was the most successful yet with a large crowd fully enjoying themselves on the night. A lengthy discussion followed. There was some support for further At The Wharf events to be held during winter. It was resolved that Karen pursue a possible winter At The Wharf event, including likely entertainment costs and discussions with Leah Grace regarding dates, and report to the next meeting. [Editor's Note: see details elsewhere in this newsletter as this event, with a slightly changed operating system, is now being planned.] A further discussion ensued. This focussed on the possibility of involving additional Goolwa food businesses with others from wider in the Alexandrina area. Keith congratulated Karen and all volunteers on the success of At The Wharf. This sentiment was unanimously supported.

Goolwa Farmers Market:

Jane Williams reported that the RSL and Encounter Bay Rotary, organisers of the Goolwa Wharf Market, are supportive of the proposal that a Goolwa Farmers Market be established. A submission for Council consideration is in preparation. Public liability cover is being pursued.

Supporting the Community.

Ken Smith, and later Sue Maxted, reported on the recent Lions Combined Services dinner meeting, involving a number of key local community groups. The focus of the meeting was local residents in need, be it through homelessness, domestic violence or other circumstances and to consider ways that community groups could provide support. On the night representatives of Junction Australia, Whalers and others spoke on their experiences with Lions and other groups, including Cittaslow, offering support. Lions have established a Homelessness Poverty Group to pursue the matter and Sue is a member of that committee. A detailed discussion followed the report. This focused on translating the strong support for the issues from the group into tangible support, guided by those with experience. It was suggested that President Lyn be asked to contact the other Australian Cittaslows to see if they had any experience in providing this type of support to the community.

It was resolved that Sue advise the Lions of Cittaslow Goolwa support and report on progress to later meetings, that members of the Food and Wine Group consider ways of providing support to those in need in the community and that the matter be further discussed at the next meeting.

Scott Woodsmith advised that a meeting of the Smoke Off sub-committee should occur in June and that he would be in contact with Lian Jaensch, representative of the Langhorne Creek wineries. Scott also invited additional volunteers to join the sub-committee. Jane undertook to contact representatives of the Oscar W and the Steam Ranger to ideally co-ordinate their involvement in Smoke Off 2016. The addition of Cittaslow signage and logos to the recently purchased marquees was also discussed and Debbie (about Print and CatScratch Design) and Margaret (Notable Imprint) undertook to seek quotes. [Editor's Note: The date for the 2016 Cittaslow Smoke Off is Sunday 6 November.]

GOOLWA FRUIT FOREST

Kathryn Wilson has been developing the idea of a Goolwa Fruit Forest. This is public orchard managed by volunteers on land allocated by the Alexandrina Council. The park area being considered is on Birchall Road, next to Thornbury Park.

Cittaslow Goolwa is sponsoring this project which should benefit vulnerable groups such as children, low-income earners and the homeless to be able to pick fruit and maybe nuts as required. The orchard will be established and maintained by volunteers and community groups. Alexandrina Council has been supportive of this project as have the service organisations Lions and Rotary. Other groups that have indicated their support have been Whalers, OPAL, Goolwa Primary School Breakfast Club, Flo Victor Harbor, Alexandrina Connect, South Coast Christian Care and Goolwa Coastcare.

In a presentation Kathryn made to Council she stated, "Something that is offered freely cannot be stolen ... vandalism is usually caused by resentment over inequality ... the orchard is an attempt to create equality [and] vandalism can be kept to a minimum. The Fruit Forest concept is to provide free fruit to those who need it."

A public meeting was called to ascertain support for this project and the meeting was well attended. A small group of people to coordinate the development and implementation of this concept is now needed.

CITTASLOW COMMUNITY GARDEN

Last month the community garden hosted the 2nd **Composting Workshop** with Sophie Thompson as guest presenter. The weather again was perfect and the garden volunteers provided a sumptuous morning tea for over 50 locals including some who had also attended the previous workshop. It was a good opportunity for some locals to have a look around the garden even though a lot of the garden beds were being cleared in preparation for winter crops. FRWA also had on sale some composting equipment like kitchen caddies, compostable bags and bins as well as worm farms. These are available through FRWA at a very low cost to residents so there is no excuse for not composting.

This was an initiative of Fleurieu Regional Waste Authority and it coincides with the introduction on 1st July of fortnightly bin collection and how we can make more use of our recyclable waste.

According to statistics our blue bins contain 69% of recyclable material

including 9% green organics and a staggering 38% food and compostable paper which if managed correctly can help make great compost to improve the health of our garden soil.

If you missed the workshop please contact the FRWA as they are hoping to conduct more of these workshops in the future.


